Bashou's [Oku no Hosomichi] and Kawase Family ~Namerikawa Guidepost series #6 of 13~

On July 13th, 1689, Bashou Matsuo and his apprentice Sora, in the midst of their travel to the Northern Prefectures, arrived in Namerikawa during the evening hours. It was believed that the men stayed at an inn owned by the Kawase family. In 1763, Chijuu Kawase engraved a poem of Bashou's in the Tokuzyouji Temple, to commemorate the poet's visit. At that time the temple was located in Ara-machi, but was moved to its current location in 1880.

Following Oo-machi and Sewa-machi, Ara-machi is said to have been the next established region during the Keicho years (1596~1615). The Hokkoku road runs both east and west of Ara-machi's coastline, and houses were built on both sides of the road.
